The Duchess of Richmond's Ball

On 15 June 1815 the Duchess of Richmond held the most famous ball in history in a coach house in Rue de la Blanchisserie in Brussels.

When asked by the Duchess whether he would permit her to have a ball, Wellington replied at his most charming: "Duchess, you may give your ball with the greatest safety, without fear of interruption."

In fact, Wellington's prediction of a drama free evening was misplaced. During the ball the Prince of Orange received a message that Bonaparte had crossed the frontier at Charleroi, much earlier than expected, and was himself heading for Quatre Bras.

The Ball soon became a hive of army activity with orders being given to all the officers to get to their positions by 3 a.m, and much anxiety amongst the ladies as they bade farewell to their loved ones. Even Wellington left the ball unfashionably early saying to the Duke of Richmond: "Napoleon has humbugged me, by God; he has gained twenty-four hours' march on me". The following day the Prussian forces under Marshal

Blücher were defeated at the battle of Ligny. The English retreated from Quatre Bras to the site at Waterloo which, remarkably, Wellington had inspected a year earlier. Fortunately, Napoleon's forces were unable to split the Prussians from the English forces, and the scene was set for the famous battle at Waterloo on Sunday, 18th June 1815.

Dr Andrew Roberts, who was born in 1963, took a first class honours degree in Modern History at Gonville & Caius College, Cambridge, from where he is an honorary senior scholar and a Doctor of Philosophy (PhD). He has written or edited twelve books, and appears regularly on radio and television around the world. Based in London, he is an accomplished public speaker, and has recently lectured at Yale, Princeton and Stanford Universities and at the US Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania.

His most recent book, *Napoleon the Great*, won the Prix du Jury des Grands Prix de la Fondation Napoléon 2014.
